Epsom Live Talk

Epsom College Malaysia recently had the privilege of welcoming Mr. Voon Keat Lai, a leading figure in Artificial Intelligence (AI) and digital transformation, delivered a talk titled "An Introduction to AI and Prompt Engineering.", allowing students to have a fascinating insight into how AI can be used in more ways than we originally imagined.


Mr. Voon Keat Lai's career spans not just in law and technology but also across fields such as corporate finance, management consulting and more. He is also known for his book, *The AI Empowered Lawyer's Cookbook*, which explores how legal professionals can use AI tools to enhance research, writing, and productivity. Showing how AI can be applied creatively and responsibly in real-world professions.

During his session at Epsom College, Mr. Voon introduced students to the core ideas behind Artificial Intelligence, explaining how machines can analyse data, recognise patterns, and generate creative outputs. He then delved into the emerging concept of Prompt Engineering.

Using demonstrations and a step by step breakdown, he showed how different prompts could completely change an AI's output, proving that effective communication with AI requires both creativity and logical thinking. For example the temperature of an AI, as he explained, determines how creative or predictable its responses are. A lower temperature (close to 0) makes the AI more focused, consistent, and factual, ideal for technical writing or coding. A higher temperature (closer to 1), on the other hand, allows for more imaginative and varied answers, by adjusting this setting, users can fine-tune how the AI "thinks" and responds to prompts.

Students left the session inspired, equipped with a deeper understanding of AI and the motivation to explore how they could apply these skills in their studies and future careers. Mr. Voon's passion, humour, and clarity made a lasting impression on everyone in attendance.

As Epsom College continues to champion innovation and forward thinking, events like this remind students that technology is not just about machines, it's about how humans use them to make a difference.

On the 25th of September, the U18 Girls' Football Team travelled to King Henry VIII School for the annual KLSL Tournament. It was an intense day of football, teamwork, and determination — and it ended with Epsom lifting the cup after an incredible run of four wins, a clean sheet and some outstanding performances from every player.

Match 1: Epsom vs Taylors International School — 2-0

Epsom started strong in their opening game, pressing high and putting Taylors' defence under immediate pressure. Despite attempts to counter, our back line held firm, allowing the wingers to push forward with confidence. Daniela opened the scoring with a precise shot into the bottom right corner, putting Epsom ahead. The team maintained control into the second half, and after a series of corners and close chances, Daniela struck again in the final minutes, securing a 2-0 win.

Match 2: Epsom vs Oasis International School — 1-0

Oasis proved a tough opponent, starting on the attack and testing both the defence and the goalkeeper early on. The midfield worked tirelessly to keep the ball moving, and a number of key saves kept the score level at half time. The second half was tightly contested, with both sides battling to gain the upper hand. After a well-defended free kick — including a brave block from Sophie that left her with a memorable souvenir — Epsom regained momentum. In the final minutes, Daniela once again delivered, scoring a brilliant goal from outside the box to give Epsom a 1-0 victory.

Match 4: Epsom vs King Henry VIII — 5-0

The final match against the host school was a fitting conclusion to the tournament. King Henry VIII came out strong, but Epsom was ready. Eexynn opened the scoring, followed by goals from Sophie and Adriana to make it 3-0 at half time. The hosts started the second half determined to fight back, but a crucial 1v1 save kept Epsom's clean sheet intact. From there, the team pushed forward — Daniela set up Eexyn for her second of the game, and Adriana added another with a stunning finish into the top corner. Eexyn completed her hat trick in the closing minutes, bringing the final score to 5-0.

Epsom ended the day undefeated, with a remarkable record of four wins, twelve goals scored, and none conceded. It was an outstanding team effort from start to finish — every player played their part, from the keeper's composure and the defence's discipline to the midfield's control and the strikers' finishing.

A Call For Change: The Assassination of Charlie Kirk

On September 10, 2025, conservative commentator and activist Charlie Kirk was shot and killed at Utah Valley University during his iconic public Q&A sessions, where he answered the questions of the public and often engaged in debates with audience members. This attack has caused global mourning and a call to action about violence and political division in America.

Charlie Kirk was a 31-year-old father who was the CEO of Turning Point USA, a U.S. conservative student organisation founded in 2012 by Charlie Kirk to promote free markets, limited government, and conservative values on campuses. He gained significant popularity through his social media and college tours. Some could argue that, although he wasn't actually a politician, he was one of the biggest modern-day faces of American conservatism.

During his afternoon Q&A, a single gunshot struck Kirk in the neck, causing the whole event to shut down immediately, while Kirk was rushed to the hospital. Meanwhile, police began a manhunt for the shooter, later identified as 22-year-old Tyler James Robinson. Utah prosecutors have charged Robinson with aggravated murder and plan to seek the death penalty.

The news of Charlie Kirk's assassination sparked an immediate wave of grief and condemnation from across the political spectrum. Utah's Governor Spencer Cox said he was 'heartbroken' and that he and his family were praying for Kirk's loved ones. President Donald Trump described Kirk as "a great guy, top to bottom." Online, reactions from ordinary Americans were mixed but largely sober. Many expressed sadness, even those who disagreed with Kirk's politics. One

commentator said, "Voicing your opinion shouldn't get you killed." Broadcaster Samantha Ponder said the hostility she received for expressing sympathy showed "How divided the country had become."

The assassination of Charlie Kirk stands as a tragic reminder of how deeply divided we are as a society. His death shocked not only his fans and supporters but also reignited national conversations about political violence and free speech.

Taylor Swift's

2023:

The two of them were publicly linked for the first time on July 8, 2023, when observant fans spotted Travis in the audience of her Eras Tour show at Arrowhead Stadium, where he watched from a private box. In episode 50 of his New Heights podcast (which he co-hosts with his brother Jason), Travis revealed that he was 'a little butt-hurt' that he was unable to give Taylor a handmade bracelet he made for her with his number on it, jokingly saying that he 'took it personal.'

By September 2023, Taylor was spotted at an NFL game, watching from Travis's suite with his mom, Donna. She later clarified that, at this time, they were already a couple but hadn't publicly revealed it yet. Throughout the rest of 2023, photos of them holding hands, having dinner together, and kissing each other surfaced online. Additionally, Taylor was seen at the 2024 & 2025 Super Bowls & regular NFL games in support of the Kansas City Chiefs, where Travis plays as tight end. Travis, in return, showed up in support of her other Eras Tour concerts and has been mentioned in multiple songs across two albums: The Tortured Poets Department from April last year ("The Alchemy," "So High School") and recently released Life of a Showgirl ("The Fate of Ophelia," "Opalite," "Wi\$h Li\$t," and "Honey").

2024:

On June 23, 2024, Travis joined Taylor on stage for her Eras Tour at Wembley Stadium in London, where he carried her in his arms. Following false breakup rumours, which were quickly debunked, the pair were spotted together at the US Open in September.

On August 26, 2025, Taylor Swift and Travis Kelce simultaneously announced their engagement through a joint Instagram post with a series of photos from their proposal, captioned, "Your English teacher and your gym teacher are getting married 💍." For current and new fans, here's a summary of their relationship leading up to their engagement:

2025:

In August 2025, Taylor reappeared on the New Heights podcast and announced her 12th studio album, 'The Life of a Showgirl,' by taking out a vinyl version of the album from a mint green suitcase with her initials on it. After recording the podcast, Travis proposed to her afterwards in the back garden, and the couple waited for about two weeks before posting their carousel of engagement photos. Taylor later appeared on The Graham Norton Show and revealed that Travis set up the back garden while the podcast episode was being recorded and that he "went all out" for the "10/10 proposal."

The most recent flood was one of the worst the state has seen in 30 years. The floods and landslides were triggered by days of continuous rainfall beginning on September 12, and the disaster spread across multiple districts in Sabah. A total of 14 lives were lost, 13 from the landslides and 1 from the flooding itself. The worst tragedy occurred in Inanam, where a landslide buried several homes and killed 7 people, including 4 children between the ages of 2 and 9.

The floods affected over 2,500 people from hundreds of families, many of whom needed to be moved to dozens of temporary shelters. In order to help victims and aid state recovery efforts, Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim ordered the federal government to provide 10 million ringgit in aid through the National Disaster Management Agency (NADMA).



One of the most heartbreaking stories is that of Oliver Golingai, a father of four from Penampang. What began as a peaceful afternoon turned into a nightmare for this family when mud, trees, and boulders unexpectedly crashed down the hill behind their home. Golingai carried his toddler to safety while his three other children ran hand in hand to their grandparents' house. "One moment I was watching television shows with my younger children and the next, we had to run for our lives," he remarked. When he returned to visit the following morning, half of his house was buried in mud, while the rest was filled with debris.

This tragedy has reignited urgent discussions around Sabah's preparedness for natural disasters. According to experts and civil engineers, urban expansion, especially in areas like Kota Kinabalu, has outpaced the capacity of existing drainage systems. Rescue efforts are also delayed because rural communities are still hard to reach in an emergency due to inadequate road access. The construction of large-scale water reservoirs has been a need for a long time. This is to control flooding and also addresses Sabah's ongoing water security issues. The severe water outage that Universiti Malaysia Sabah experienced earlier this year caused disruptions to campus operations, highlighting the vulnerability of the state's water management systems. It is clear that Sabah can no longer afford to put off long-term, sustainable solutions as the effects of climate change and development pressures increase.

The Wonder of the Mid- Autumn Festival

Also known as the Moon Festival, it falls on the 15th day of the eighth lunar month, when the moon is said to be at its brightest and fullest.

Many legends are linked to the festival, the most famous being the tale of Chang'e, the Moon Goddess, who drank an elixir of immortality and floated to the moon, where she still resides today.

In schools and communities, the festival is often marked by performances, storytelling, and lantern-making activities. These traditions help younger generations appreciate their cultural roots while celebrating under the same glowing moon that has inspired poets and dreamers for centuries.

Typhoon Bualoi in Vietnam

Parts of Vietnam were pounded by incessant rain and gusty winds of up to 130 kilometres per hour as Typhoon Bualoi made landfall in the late hours of September 28, 2025. At least 11 people have died, and more than a dozen are missing. According to disaster authorities, around 44,200 properties were damaged, with impacts including torn-off roofs, fallen trees, and 6,000 hectares of flooded crops.

Furthermore, more than 300,000 households lost power. On September 29, a Philippine civil defence official stated that the death toll had more than doubled to 27, with most victims either drowning or being struck by debris. Several towns and cities remain cut off.



The Vietnamese government has ordered all-out rescue efforts to evacuate more than 53,000 residents from coastal areas to schools and medical centres, which had been converted to temporary shelters. However, emergency personnel are reportedly struggling to reach communities isolated by landslides and flash floods.

All four airports in central Vietnam, Dong Hoi, Tho Xuan, Phu Bai, and Da Nang, have resumed operations after being closed due to typhoon Bualoi, which affected more than 450 flights nationwide, with about 100 flights cancelled. Railway services also faced major disruptions, with several trains being suspended and many others being forced to stop at stations due to disturbed tracks. Luckily, Bualoi has weakened as it moved across the border into Laos since making landfall in Vietnam.



Locals from Vietnam say the storm was unlike anything they have seen before.




Harvard's Breakthrough: Supercharging Immune System

Scientists at Harvard Medical School have discovered a new way to make our immune system better at fighting cancer — by removing a kind of “brake” that slows it down. The breakthrough centres on immunotherapy, a treatment that trains the body’s immune system to recognise and attack cancer cells. It’s already transformed cancer care for many patients, but it doesn’t work for everyone. That’s because some cancers are sneaky — they find ways to hide from or weaken immune cells.


The new study, published on August 12th 2025, in *Nature Immunology*, focuses on improving the performance of a key group of immune cells called CD8+ T cells. These are often referred to as “killer T-cells” because their job is to find and destroy harmful or cancerous cells.

The team discovered that a protein called STUB1 acts like a molecular brake inside T-cells (a type of white blood cell that fights disease). It interferes with signals that normally help these cells stay active and effective in attacking tumours. When scientists used gene-editing technology to remove the STUB1 gene from the T-cells in mice, they became much stronger cancer fighters. The mice with modified T-cells had slower tumour growth and lived longer, showing the success of their research and encouraging them to develop it further.



This finding is important because it could make existing immunotherapies work for more patients. Some cancers can grow resistant to current treatments, but if scientists can find a safe way to block STUB1 — either with a drug or by engineering T-cells without it — the immune system could stay switched “on” for longer and attack cancer more effectively.

While the research is still in early stages and has not yet been tested in people, it offers a promising new direction for cancer treatment. By understanding how to release these hidden brakes in the immune system, scientists are one step closer to making immunotherapy a more universal and powerful weapon against cancer.
