House Debate

The annual Epsom College Inter House Debate Competition took place this March, bringing together students from all houses to speak, argue, and impress. The competition was spread over three exciting days — with the Junior and Intermediate heats on Monday 3rd March, the Senior heats on Tuesday 4th March, and the Finals on Thursday 6th March.

This year's event featured three categories: Junior, Intermediate, and Senior. Each level had its own theme, and students debated a range of interesting and important topics.

As a member of the Rosebery Intermediate team, I had the opportunity to debate against Propert on the motion, "This

House regrets the rise of the social media influencer." Representing the Opposition, we put forward our strongest arguments, but despite our efforts, Propert came out on top. Although we didn't win, the experience was incredibly rewarding — it challenged me to think critically, speak confidently, and work closely with my team under pressure.

The Junior category explored the theme of childhood. In the first heat, Holman House, arguing for the motion, faced Crawford House in a debate about whether our early years shape who we become the most. In the second heat, Carr House went up against Rosebery on the topic of whether children under the age of 16 should be allowed to work. The Intermediate category focused on the idea of success. Crawford and Granville discussed whether tourism causes more harm than good in developing countries, while Propert and Rosebery tackled the impact of social media influencers. In the Senior category, the theme was law and order, which brought forward some of the most serious and complex discussions of the competition. Rosebery, on the proposition side, argued that juvenile criminals should be treated the same as adults, while Crawford opposed the motion. In another intense debate, Granville and Propert discussed whether the police should be defunded and the money redirected to social services.

The Finals, held on Thursday 6th March in the theatre, brought together the top teams from each category. The evening was filled with excitement and anticipation as the audience gathered to watch the best of the best compete. In the Junior Final, students from Carr and Crawford debated whether developing soft skills is more important than gaining qualifications. The Intermediate Final explored the idea of whether going to university should still be seen as the main path to success with the teams from Crawford and Propert showcasing their deep understanding of their arguments. In the Senior Final, teams from Rosebery and Propert ended the night with a powerful debate on whether surveillance is justified in the interest of national security and public safety. While the competition was a chance to win points for their houses, it was about much more than that. It was a celebration of student voice, critical thinking, and respectful disagreement. Every speaker brought something valuable to the stage, and every team worked hard to represent their house with pride. Every debate was beautifully crafted and every team performed with such great passion. The scores were close and every debater gave it their all. After multiple deliberations the results were announced, Crawford had won both the junior and inter debates and Propert prevailed to win the senior debate.

A huge thank you goes to the judges, adjudicators and Mrs. Prestidge for organising the debate as well as to all the debaters who participated and gave it their all and made the competition so successful and rewarding for all. Challenges and Competition



Ramadan

Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic lunar calendar and a key time for Muslims to fast, pray, think about life, and connect with others. It's also when the Quran is said to have been first shown to the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH)

Fasting in Ramadan is one of the five main duties in Islam, so it's a must for most adult Muslims. People who are sick, old, pregnant, breastfeeding, on their period, or traveling get a pass. From dawn to sunset, there's no eating or drinking, but it's not just about skipping meals. It's a way to clean up your spirit, focus on prayer, and get closer to God through the Quran.

The day starts with suhur, a meal before dawn to keep you going, and ends with iftar, a dinner with family and friends to break the fast. Ramadan lasts 29 or 30 days, depending on when the crescent moon shows up. During this month, doing good things and helping others is thought to bring extra blessings, so Muslims use the time to boost their faith, give to charity, and ask for forgiveness.



North Korea Puts Out First Nuclear Threat

In October 2006, North Korea alarmed the international community by announcing and conducting its first nuclear test. This marked the country's official entry into the nuclear regime, holding itself up with power and defiance.

They had long been under suspicion of developing nuclear weapons, this underground test confirmed those fears and transformed international concerns into a serious global security issue, casting light on North Korea's morality. It showed North Korea's readiness to challenge diplomatic and societal norms and put itself at risk of isolation in exchange for military strength.

The United Nations condemned the test and imposed economic sanctions aimed at restraining North Korea's access to nuclear materials and funds. Despite this, the DPRK insisted its actions were in self-defense against perceived threats from the U.S. and South Korea.



The roots of the conflict dates back to the 1994 Agreed Framework, in which North Korea agreed to halt its nuclear program in exchange for aid. Trust collapsed on both sides in the early 2000s, the deal fell apart, and the DPRK resumed its nuclear development, this time more aggressively.

For North Korea, possessing nuclear weapons is about more than defense—it is a strategic tool. It offers leverage in international negotiations and strengthens the regime's image domestically as powerful and independent. It also serves as a warning to other nations not to interfere with its sovereignty.



Diplomatic efforts, such as the Six-Party Talks involving China, the U.S., South Korea, Russia, and Japan, have had limited success. While some agreements were reached, none held for long. Attempts at high-level diplomacy, including summits with U.S. leaders, have not led to lasting denuclearization.



Since 2006, North Korea has conducted several more nuclear and missile tests, each time improving its capabilities and reach. These developments continue to raise fears of instability in East Asia and beyond.

North Korea's first nuclear threat was not just a regional event—it marked a global pivotal point. Where it brought light to the challenges of managing nuclear proliferation and the dangers posed by states that act outside international norms.



Nepalese calls for return of the king

On Sunday, 9 March 2025, thousands of Nepalese welcomed former King Gyanendra Shah upon his arrival at Tribhuvan International Airport in Kathmandu. He was greeted by supporters waving Nepal's flag and chanting slogans like "Come king, save the nation!". An estimated 10,000 supporters gathered outside the airport, blocking its main entrance and shouting, "Vacate the royal palace for the king!" and "Long live our beloved king!" as Gyanendra returned from a tour of Western Nepal. The crowd demanded the restoration of the monarchy nearly 17 years after its dissolution, driven by growing disenchantment with Nepal's political establishment.



Massive street protests in 2006 had forced Gyanendra to give up his authoritarian rule, and two years later, the parliament voted to abolish its 240-year-old monarchy after a decade-long civil war that left over 16,000 dead. Gyanendra left the Royal Palace and adopted the life of a commoner. However, many Nepalis have grown frustrated with the republic, saying it has failed to bring about political stability and blaming it for a struggling economy and widespread corruption. Since the monarchy was abolished in 2008, Nepal has seen 13 governments.

Among the crowd was 50-year-old carpenter Kulraj Shrestha, who had participated in the 2006 protests against the king but has since changed his mind and now supports the monarchy.

"The worst thing that is happening to the country is massive corruption and all politicians in power are not doing anything for the country," Shrestha said. "I was in the protests that took away the monarchy hoping it would help the country, but I was mistaken and the nation has further plunged so I have changed my mind."

Gyanendra has not commented on the calls for the return of monarchy. Despite growing support, the former king Gyanendra has slim chances of immediately returning to power.
